

# Banwell Parish Council – Who We Are

Parish and Town Councils are the level of local government closest to the needs of local people. A Parish Council is the first tier of local government in England and as an elected body we are responsible and responsive to our electorate, (that's you!).

Laws give the Parish Council a wide remit to improve the lives of their local community. The Council collects a precept each year (a sum collected with the council tax each year from the householders in the parish) to maintain and improve facilities and services for local people. Our work falls into three categories:

- Representing the community
- Delivering services to meet local needs
- Striving to improve quality of life in the Parish.

You can see from the table below what your Parish Council is responsible for – and also what North Somerset Council has to do. It's helpful to know who to go to when you have a question or a problem. # **Banwell Parish Councillors & Staff**

Banwell Parish Council is made up of 12 Councillors - all of whom are volunteers. The period of office of a Councillor is normally 4 years, but if they have been co-opted or elected at a by-election, they will serve until the next normal election.

#### Banwell Parish Council Chairman's Report 2023-24 (Paul Blatchford)

The It has been another busy year for the Parish Council with not one but two elephants in the room in the shape of the Bypass and the Local Plan, more of which later.

I am pleased to say that we have two new councillors, Steve Voller and Kelly Smith which brings us up to 12 so that currently there are no vacancies.

During the year we have seen the village grow with new houses at Knightcott, Jubilee Gardens and the ongoing development at Churchlands. As the village grows, we need greater staffing capacity, and I am pleased to announce that we have appointed two permanent, part-time posts, Gerry Cronin as an Administrative Officer and Sally Marks as Communication and Marketing Officer. This is also an opportunity to thank David Murphy and Dani Wolfegang-James for their contributions during the past year.

One of the major problems for the village over recent years has been the absence of a lollipop person at the school crossing or to give it its correct title a Zebra Crossing Escort person. In their wisdom North Somerset Council thought it too dangerous to employ someone to do this. May I thank Jonathan MacMillan for volunteering to do this.

Also, during the year, we worked with the Scouts to have shared solar panels installed. Thanks to the support of the North Somerset Business Fund, the Parish Council secured funding for solar panels serving both the Youth & Community Centre and the Scout Building. We are thrilled with this initiative, which will help make our community buildings more sustainable and environmentally friendly. A big thank you goes out to the Scouts for allowing us to utilise their roof space for the solar panels. Their cooperation has been invaluable in making this project a reality. With the installation of these solar panels, we're taking a step forward in reducing both our carbon footprint and embracing renewable energy. It's a small but important change that aligns with the Parish Council commitment to caring for our environment.

Soup and Roll - With a grant from North Somerset Council, we launched the 'Soup and a Roll Initiative' as part of our Public Living Room. Thanks to the grant, we maintained costs at a voluntary contribution of £1 per serving. Running until March 2024, the initiative provided soup to 565 individuals and raised £795 in voluntary contributions. Due to its overwhelming success, we're extending the program beyond March 2024, with a slight price increase to £2. Additionally, as weather warms, we'll introduce alternative offerings alongside soup.

Alongside the activities already mentioned we have also offered:

- Tea and Tech / You Can Do I.T.
- Village Cleans
- Continued live streaming of our meetings.
- The Youth Club, which has increased numbers and has summer holiday events planned.
- Lobbied against the discontinuation of the 126 bus route which has been reinstated.
- Putting on another very successful Christmas Market
- 'Back to Basics' and 'Fun for One' Cookery Courses.
- And finally, increased and renovated play equipment at Riverside and the Recreation Ground thanks to grants from North Somerset Play Innovation Fund, Section 106 contributions and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) contributions.

Back to the elephants, both of which have the potential to change the village forever.


Firstly, the Bypass, I will not go back over the fine detail but as I am sure you are aware the construction has been delayed because, (Tarmac the parent company of Griffiths), pulled the plug at the last moment. We believe this was because the project did not deliver high enough profits. We have been assured by the Bypass team that several other contractors immediately contacted them on hearing the news and it is hoped that work can start later this year. In the

meantime, you may be aware that the sub-contractors have continued with the enabling environmental works and this gives us some confidence.

Elephant number Two is the Local Plan, currently in its draft stage. It includes the planning for a new settlement in the Wolvershill area to the north of the planned Bypass. This has been mooted for many years as can be seen by the number of fields in the area that have been offered up for development by their owners. It has always been our understanding that some level of development would take place here regardless of there being a bypass or not. The Local Plan anticipates 2,800 dwellings in the area which would treble the size of Banwell. Three national developers have been working with North Somerset to plan the new settlement and the Parish has set up a Working Party to act as a conduit between our Parishioners, North Somerset and the consortium of Developers.

This process has started and is ongoing, please visit our website for further information.

Finally, this will be my last report as Chair and I would like to thank our Volunteers, Councillors (past and present) and the Council Staff for all their good work that makes Banwell such a good place to live in. However, my special thanks must go to our Clerk Liz not just for the sheer energy she puts into the roll but for keeping me and the Council on the straight and narrow during my time as Chair.



#### Your Council Tax Precept 2024/25 Explained

The primary source of income for most Parish Councils comes from the Precept, part of the Council Tax.

#### WHAT IS A PRECEPT?

The Parish Council receives a small proportion of the local Council Tax. It does not receive any direct funding from Central Government. The funding collected pays for the running of the Council and the services it provides.

#### HOW IS IT CALCULATED?


The Parish Council makes an estimate of income and expenditure for the next financial year, including some for future planned projects and/or unexpected events. It is then calculated as an amount per Council Tax Band D Property and added to the Council Tax Bill for all the dwellings within the Parish area.

#### HOW IS IT RAISED?

North Somerset Council collects your Council Tax on behalf of themselves, Police, Fire and the precepts for any Parish/Town Councils in their district. It is important to note that Banwell Parish Council's precept is just a small percentage of your overall Council Tax Bill.

#### HOW IS IT SPENT?

Your precept is spent on maintaining the facilities and services the Parish Council offers.



#### VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS

During the next year (2023/24) Banwell Parish Council are investing in the following:

- An all-weather path around the Recreation Ground which can be used all year round.
- Running top up Youth Club related activities
- Continuing the Public Living Room with the 'Soup and a Roll' initiative and other Parish Council Events throughout the year

We hope to continue to maintain our village to the highest standards, whilst keeping costs as low as possible.

### 'Soup and a Roll' in the Public Living Room

As the weather took a cold turn and the cost of living sky rocketed in 2022, Banwell Parish Council set up a Public Living Room. Whilst it doubles as a warm space, its main function is to provide a space for people to work, socialise, use free WiFi or simply to come along and get to know your neighbours. It continues throughout the year at Banwell Youth and Community Centre, **Tuesdays and Thursdays 10am-1pm**. Refreshments are available and now you can join us for lunch between **12:30 and 1:30pm**.



#### You Can Do I.T & Tea & Tech



**'You Can Do I.T.'** and **"Tea & Tech"** were launched by the Parish Council to support people of all ages improve their I.T. skills over a cup of tea. Sessions have been and continue to be held three times a month at Banwell Youth & Community Centre, fortnightly Thursdays 2-4pm and one Tuesday a month 2-4pm.

Sessions are free for all. Thank you to all the volunteers who have helped run the sessions although we are looking for more. We look forward to helping more people enhance their I.T. skills in 2024 and beyond!

### **Banwell Christmas Market**

For Christmas 2023, the community gathered for a wonderful day of Christmas stalls, refreshments and to visit Santa's Grotto. The Parish Council teamed up with local stall holders and volunteers to run the market whilst gift donations were taken by Santa for those in need.
